A couple of years ago my Pinky Winky Paniculata Hydrangea appeared to be dead and was sawn off at the base. By the end of the summer there were a number of new stems. Last year Pinky sported a mass of blooms. Proceed with caution as we are still on the shoulder of winter and there is more snow and cold weather forecast in the next several weeks. In the meantime, keep dreaming of garden bounty and colour explosions until planting season arrives.
